PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



DID YOU KNOW ...?

Did you know... community rules state the following: "...nothing may be affixed or attached to the exterior of condominium or garage buildings without first obtaining approval from the ACC."

Community CC&Rs, pg. #57 states the following: "no person shall install, erect, attach, apply, paste, hinge, screw, nail, build or construct lighting devices, shades, screens, awnings, patio covers, decorations, fences, aerials, antennae, radio or television broadcasting or receiving devices, or paint or make any changes or otherwise alter whatsoever the structural aspects or the exterior of any Condominium Building or structure containing the Units or any Restricted Residential Common Areas constructed or to be constructed within the Property."

As such, please know that Owner must seek approval of the Architectural Control Committee to attach any item to the exterior of Units. The ACC is tasked with determining if a proposed attachment or change "will not be detrimental to the appearance of the surrounding areas or the Community as a whole, that the appearance of any structure affected hereby will be in harmony with the surrounding structures."

Some examples of items include, but are not limited to cameras, decorations, floodlights, flag holders and brackets, solar devices, doorbells, Unit numbers, and all other attachments.

Thank you for your help in maintaining the aesthetic value and quality of Huntington Landmark.


JANUARY IS MAKING A NEW START

FINANCIAL REPORT

Operating Expenses Are Less

Than Income: Operating expenses for the year through month ending October 2023 were \$302,210.56 less than income.

Reserve Expenses Are


Less Than Income: Reserve expenses for the year through month ending October 2023 were \$95,841.79 less than income.

Delinquencies: Delinquency reporting has recently been changed. Past due assessments are now being separated out from past due violation fines. Our management team and legal support diligently pursue all past due accounts. The outstanding accounts receivable has increased \$33,778.72 since December 31, 2022. Of the \$82,602.15 outstanding accounts receivable, \$58,177.34 represents the balances due from 8 accounts that are currently at the attorney.

Reserve Fund: The Reserve fund was 39% funded at the close of 2022. As budgeted for 2023, contributions to the Reserve Fund remain at \$280,000 per month, (\$3,360,000 for the year). Earned interest from our Reserve CD investments contribute toward increasing the percent funded towards the recommended goal of 70%. The status of the funding of our reserves will be in the Annual Budget Report in accordance with Civil Code section 5300 and the Annual Policy Statement, Civil Code Section.

Financial Management: As inflation continues to fluctuate, it becomes more challenging for Management to stay within the budget. As this trend continues, we expect to see an increase in the cost of maintaining our community at its current elevated level of service. It is with constant diligence that our management team is holding a good rein on our finances and reviewing every contractor proposal to get the best prices for services provided.

Financial Review: The Board of Directors, in particular the CFO, President, and a Board member carefully review







HOW'S YOUR HEATING BILL?

We've all noticed an increase in our gas or electric bills this winter and there are at least two reasons for that. The price of both electricity and natural gas across the whole country has gone up and for us in Southern California; we've experienced some prolonged cold weather. You won't get any sympathy from your relatives who live in Idaho or Minnesota, but for us, turning on our heat as often as we have is unusual.

A little-known thing you can do to help make your home feel warmer is to use your ceiling fan if your condo unit is so equipped. Almost all ceiling fans have a "summer" and a "winter" setting controlled by a switch on the top of the fan. In the summer we like to have the fan send a gentle flow of cool air down on us as we sit near or under the fan. If we switch the fan to winter, it reverses the direction of the blades and it makes the flow go up toward the ceiling. Hot air rises and warmer air is at the top of our rooms and the air gets colder as you go lower toward the floor. If we set our fan to "winter" and turn it on a low speed, it sends this colder air up to the ceiling and sends the warmer air down where we are.

This also makes our heater much more efficient when we turn our heat on but even without the heat on, our rooms feel warmer without raising our gas or electric bill!

Many in Landmark know Katie Corbett, but not everyone knows of her many achievements throughout a lifetime of hard work and leadership. Katie is an award-winning newspaper business editor, public relations professional and book author. For 10 years, Katie's byline was seen daily in the Antelope Valley Press in Palmdale, California, "the Aerospace Capital of America." From features editor to business editor, Katie's reporting captured the pulse of business in the area and earned her nine press awards.

Katie later established Corbett Professional Services, a public relations company that served more than 75 companies and non-profit organizations for 18 years. In 1988, she was recognized as the U.S. Small Business Administration Regional Media Advocate of the Year by the California Select Committee on Small Business; the beautiful award is displayed in her home. Katie also served as public relations chairman for the AV Board of Trade for 20 years and was honored by the Board as a lifetime director.

Katie has edited L-1011 flight manuals at Lockheed Aircraft Company, taught high school and college engineering students and coordinated community relations for the Lancaster School District, earning state merit recognition from the California School Public Relations Association.



Katie is also a book editor and author. Her book, Through This Reporter's Eyes: A Collection of Articles by Katie Corbett, published in August 2006, is a collection of timeless tales from her writing career, such as watching the crew of Biosphere 2 reenter the Earth's atmosphere after two years, visiting Hapsburg Palace and other experiences.

Katie and her husband Carroll married May 28, 1955; they have seven grandchildren. The couple moved to Huntington Landmark in 2016. Her beloved Carroll passed just two years ago in October 2021. Katie's Landmark activities include ceramics, communications committee, discussion group, bridge, chair yoga, book club and more. She has written for Landmark Living since she moved here and is our features editor, sharing the history of Huntington Beach and Landmark, resident profiles and other community topics. A favorite was on the two 17-stories-tall hangars in Tustin built to house blimps for patrolling the West Coast for Japanese submarines. They resembled the Goodyear blimp hangars in Akron, Ohio, where she and her family lived for six years. (On November 7, 2023, a massive fire destroyed one of the famous Tustin hangars.) Katie contributes articles monthly for LL.

Katie's education includes Bachelor of Science in Education from Missouri State University and Master of Arts in Counseling from Chapman University. She is active in the American Association of University Women (past president), Palmdale Women's Club, AV Board of Trade and United Methodist Women.

Original Medicare

Part A (hospital insurance) may have a premium. If you or your spouse has worked and paid into Medicare for 10 years or more, you will not have a premium.

Part B (medical insurance) does have a premium, that starts at \$174.70, however, based on your last two years of income, it could be higher.

Part C Advantage Plan

You have the option of choosing Medicare Advantage plans, also known as Part C. These plans are offered by private insurance companies approved by Medicare. They provide all the benefits of Original Medicare and more.

Medigap / Medicare Supplement Plans

Medigap plans help fill in the gaps of Original Medicare, such as deductibles, coinsurance, and copayments. They offer you peace of mind by reducing your out-of-pocket expenses. It's like having a safety net!

Part D

Part D is offered by private insurance companies that give drug coverage. You can buy this as a stand-alone plan, or it could be included in your Part C Advantage Plan.

HOA MANAGEMENT RESPONSIBILITIES & MEMBER BENEFITS

It's a New Year and a time to refresh our understanding of how to live our best lives. Having chosen to live in an HOA, it's good to recognize the benefits of having a Management company assist with the operations of the HOA to ensure the best interests of the Homeowners are met. Toward that end, let's reflect on the work conducted by Seabreeze Management on our behalf.

Management assists and delivers several different financial reports on a monthly basis. This information is submitted to the CFO mid-month, the BOD receives 9 financial reports within 24 hours. The homeowner's report is published upon receipt to the Seabreeze website through the owner's portal. Management also coordinates with the Committees and the BOD regarding development and implementation of the Association's annual budget including the compilation from experts and vendors in regard to forecasted Costs of Operations and Revenues to Fully Fund Reserve.

Management coordinates with HOA vendors and contractors for repairs, maintenance requests, the execution of work orders, as well as large scale remediation and renovation projects. Management then monitors and evaluates staff, vendor, and contractor performance. Management plays an essential role in the processing of ACC applications and monitoring through to completion of same.

Management engages with the Board & Committees in project planning, scheduling and development of resident notifications regarding the same. They also maintain the required permits and certifications that are applicable to our facilities and projects.

Management Communicates with residents and owners via e-blasts, in-office meetings within BOD and residents, and addressing homeowner concerns both privately and in open forum Coffee and Conversation events. Management is responsible for upholding and enforcing the CC&Rs and Association rules and regulations by conducting investigations, following violation procedures, and setting up noticed hearings as needed.

Management prepares and distributes agendas and minutes for board meetings. Management assists with Community Events and produces soft programs for owners and residents.

Management personnel changes in 2023 brought further benefit to our community. The following Seabreeze Management employees comprise our HOA Management team.

- Kimberly Pollard serves as both our General Manager and as Seabreeze Vice President of Large-Scale Communities. The dual role gives us more bang for our buck as she is consistently fine-tuning large-scale properties facing the variety of challenges we face as well.

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

CONSERVATION CORNER

Happy Winter! Our heater is on for chilly mornings, the oven's fired up for holiday baking, and more lamps are lit with dark-early evenings - - all great opportunities for high energy consumption!

Southern California Edison (SCE) sent data on our power consumption recently. It was a good reminder to think about how we can cut back and reduce our electric bill.

In addition to my energy saving ideas in last month's column, here are some recommendations from SCE and our community:

- Shut off your oven for the final 7 minutes of cooking; the trapped heat will finish the job.
- Wash laundry in cold water. It saves energy and is gentler on clothes. Select the appropriate water level for the load size and the highest spin speed available to remove moisture and reduce the time and energy needed to dry

clothing. A cold wash cycle may save up to 10 times as much energy.

• Clothes dryers are one of the largest energy users in our homes accounting for almost 2 percent of our nation's electricity consumption. Drying one large load of laundry is more economical than two small loads, so think big!



• Turn down the brightness on your TV. Most viewing occurs at night

anyway, so turning down your TV's brightness will greatly reduce its energy output.

- Unplug unused electronics and chargers. Standby power can account for 10% of your annual electricity use.
- Replace your incandescent light bulbs with more efficient LEDs.
- Cook with your microwave or air fryer to keep your home cooler and reduce energy costs.
- Turn off the lights in rooms you are not using.
- Turn off power strips when not in use they draw power as well.
- Use major appliances before 4:00 pm, when rates go up.
